

## REACH • BENEFIT • EMPOWERMENT AND GENDER EQUALITY

Feed the Future uses sex-disaggregated data and the Women's Empowerment in Agriculture Index (WEAI) data reported by our partners and USAID field missions to measure and track progress toward women's empowerment and gender equality.

## REACH

In 2017, the number of women trained (producers and others) in Feed the Future zones of influence reached more than **3.2 million** - **44 percent** of all training participants.

**Senegal:** The number of women farmers who participated in training grew **40 percent** in four years.<sup>2</sup>

**Tanzania:** In new Farmer Field Schools, women represented **74 percent** of students.<sup>3</sup>

Ethiopia: More than **2,800** economic and social associations promote household savings, loans, and open discussion.<sup>4</sup>

## BENEFIT

Women made up **40 percent** of all program participants who are applying new technologies - more than **3.6 million** total.

Honduras: Nearly **2,000** women entrepreneurs trained in marketing, management, and production. Their sales rose by **50 percent** and incomes by **81 percent**. <sup>5</sup>


**Ghana:** Women farmers who adopted row planting increased yields **30 percent** over those who had no training.<sup>6</sup>

## **EMPOWER**

Between 2012 and 2015, more than **2.6 million** morewomen in Feed the Future zones of influence had access to, and made decisions about, credit. This reflects a **30 percent** increase across the initiative. In Africa, that percentage was nearly **50 percent**.
